2016 Annual Summary

The Wisconsin Master Naturalist Program is a growing network of well-informed citizens dedicated to conservation education and service within their communities. Volunteers perform at least 40 hours of volunteer service each year and receive 8 additional hours of training annually to maintain certification. The volunteer training course provides coursework in natural history, interpretation, and conservation stewardship in both the classroom and field settings delivered by partner organizations throughout the state.
